Going All In at the 2025 Mobile Literary Festival

Over 100 writers bet on themselves at the seventh Mobile Literary Festival. Held annually each spring at the Ben May Main Library, the April 5, 2025 festival packed the day with panel discussions and writing workshops on both the craft of writing and the publishing industry. Attendees were also treated to poetry readings, the Writerspace Writers' Space, The Haunted Book Shop popup shop, and the Writing Away Refuge Pitch War.

The day kicked off with a brief welcome in Bernheim Hall by festival founder Jodie Cain Smith. Then attendees dove into a discussion on marketing trends and tips, including best practices, the marketing tasks authors face, and how AI may help promoters lighten that load. Additional Bernheim Hall panel discussions examined plotting, giving and receiving feedback, and how to craft a hook that will make readers 'go all in' on a story.

Besides the Bernheim Hall sessions, attendees enjoyed the Smart Bet Series of workshops in the Armbrecht Meeting Room. Book Formatting for the Self-Publisher, Editing: What editors expect and what authors need, and Submitting Short Works for Publication proved popular among attendees.

The last session of the day has become the most anticipated event during the Mobile Literary Festival – the Writing Away Refuge Pitch War. Twenty writers received feedback on their book pitches from literary agent Alexandra Grana of the Corvisiero Agency. The opportunity for pitch feedback from a literary agent is invaluable to writers, but what makes Pitch War fun for audiences is the format. Book pitches are read aloud

anonymously, then audience members vote whether to buy or pass on the pitch.

While the Bernheim Hall and **Armbrecht Meeting Room sessions** were entertaining and informative, the fun didn't stop there. In the Ben May Main Library lobby, attendees enjoyed Sue Brannan Walker's Brown Bag Poetry Lunch & Listen, shopped local author books in The Haunted Book Shop popup shop, and shared resources, publishing opportunities, and writing insights in the Writerspace Writers' Space. This was the first festival appearance by Writerspace. com, a promotions firm that bridges the gap between authors and readers and won't be their last. The Writers' Space also featured a community story collaboration with contributors creating an original story, one writer and one line at a time.

The 2025 Mobile Literary Festival closed with a reception where attendees could mingle with each other, ask authors for signatures, vie for door prizes, and indulge in sweet treats and snacks.

Jodie Cain Smith, founder of the Mobile Literary Festival shared, "This FREE festival depends on the support of volunteer staffers and faculty members, the Mobile Public Library, Writing Away Refuge, Mobile Writers Guild, The Haunted Book Shop, and Writerspace.com. It brings Mobile's literary community together for a day of learning, creative support, and relationship building – new and old – like no other Mobile event does." 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Required or Inspired: Finding Children's and Teen Books for the Summer and Beyond

Will your children or teens be required to read over the



summer? Would vou also like to inspire them to love reading? The library has titles in print, ebook, and some audiobooks. Find school reading assignments, and foster a love of reading by getting them books they choose with your guidance.

The library owns many titles on school reading lists,

but with a limited number of copies, at least in print. If your child wants a print copy, place a "Hold" on a title. You may get it right away, or you may have to wait.

The longer you wait to place a Hold on a title, the less chance there is to get a copy before the school year begins. You may place one on a print copy through the MPL to Go app, the library website, or call the library. If there are other Holds on the book, your child will only have three weeks to read

Don't forget that ebooks are also available. Ebooks can be found in the library's catalog with the print copies and audiobooks. The digital titles can be downloaded from the catalog through the Hoopla and Cloud Library apps. You may set these apps to "Kids Mode," so that only children's materials will be visible.

If the ebook is in the Hoopla app, there is no waiting. You may download it right away. In the Cloud Library app, it may not be available immediately. You may place a Hold on it.

After three weeks, the digital title will automatically be returned. You may download it again in Hoopla. However, it may not be available in time for summer reading in Cloud Library. Because of school reading lists, there is a high probability that it will be used to fill someone else's Hold.



Often a child or teen is required to read an Accelerated Reader on a certain grade level, but they may choose which book. Most books, except for ones published in the past two or three years, do have an AR test.

The library website has limited lists by grade level and "Top 100" titles under the Services tab at the top of the homepage. For a complete list of titles in the AR database, check Accelerated Reader apps, such as "Pointscan" or "AR Book Finder," or www.arbookfind.

The apps are especially convenient for browsing in the library. Your child may choose a title, then just scan the publisher's barcode on the back of the book. If there is a test, the AR level, points, etc. appear.

To inspire your child to read, choice is an effective way to develop a life-long love of reading, as well as develop reading comprehension. Whether it is at, below, or above grade level, reading enjoyment predicts reading success.

The library offers ways for children and teens to find books they love. Library staff are a good source. Assistance is available in the library and through "Your Next Book" located on the homepage under the Borrow tab.

A great online resource for children and teens is the database NoveList K-8 Plus, located by choosing "Online Research" on the library homepage. This database gives reading recommendations for fiction and nonfiction.

Many search options,

such as the following,

are available. "Appeal" factors let children and teens choose between dozens of options including character, storyline, pace, tone, writing style, and illustration. Another great feature is lists such as "Must Reads" and "Trending Now." Also, if they want a book similar to one they've already read, they can click on a title, and a list of "Read-Alikes" will

For summer and beyond, the library is here to help your children and teens get what is required, and to inspire them with a world of choices.
