
MOBILE Public Library is ready to serve students of every age throughout the school year. Free library cards give students and caregivers access to over 500,000 physical items from our 11 locations and access to over a million digital items that include books of all types and for all age levels.

Your library card grants free access to over 100 research databases that can aid students with assignments from elementary school to college-level curriculum. Databases include Britannica Library, NewsBank, Gale and Points of View. Tutor.com provides assistance from certified teachers for help with anything from math to editing research papers.

Other online tutoring resources such as Learning Express provide test preparation for

nearly every standardized test, including the ACT and ASVAB. With a student's library card they have free access to learning a new language through a resource called Pronunciator and courses online with Universal Class.

Parents can take advantage of our book bundles selected based on the age and ability of the child. Our talented staff pick the books for

Tails and Tales Summer Reading Celebration Recap

THE theme for Summer 2021 at the Mobile Public Library was "Tails & Tales." Throughout history, all kinds of animals have roamed the land and soared through the air. Many have both a Tail and a Tale. For this year's program, MPL was pleased to join with local nature groups to discover the diversity of animal life in the Mobile area, create fond memories, and share the joy of reading through a variety of virtual and in-person programs.

All across Mobile, MPL challenged people of all ages to read, learn new skills and try different activities through participating in the Tails & Tales Summer Reading Celebration. The Alabama Gulf Coast Zoo provided us with 50 Family Passes to give as prizes to our participants.

The reading challenge was simple: Read 400 minutes to earn prizes. The more participants read, the more chances they had to win. For their 400-or-more minutes of reading, all ages were eligible to win a water bottle and a grand-prize drawing entry. The Grand Prizes included a Nintendo Switch Lite and an air fryer. A total of 2,765 people took the challenge.

Participants could also enjoy a Weekly Family Activity Challenge, a Teen Summer Activity Challenge,

and a Road Trip Trivia game -- each with chances to win unique prizes and featuring a variety of fun and engaging activities. As a bonus, all the activities encouraged continued learning and prevention of the dreaded summer slide.

Thinking Money for Kids Exhibit is Heading to Mobile

MPL's selection to host the exhibit is thanks to a competitive national grant from the American Library Association (ALA) and the FINRA Investor Education Foundation. West Regional is one of only 50 sites selected to

host Thinking Money for Kids on its two-year tour of the United States. Nearly 130 public libraries across the country applied for the opportunity, according to ALA. Thinking Money for Kids is a new multimedia experience for children ages 7 to 11, as well as their parents, caregivers and educators. The interactive exhibit uses games, activities and a fun storyline to help children understand what money is,

its function in society, money choices, and money values, such as fairness, responsibility and charitableness. The 1,000-square-foot exhibition will be on display for six weeks beginning on Monday, December 6. In addition to the display, the library will host a series of related special events for children, teens, adults and families. Be sure to watch MPL's website and social media pages for updates.

MS Word and Google Docs are available on all public computers. Need help getting your resume perfect? Get help at the Connection Center.




Get a job

Most jobs are advertised and applied for solely online.




Create a presentation for work or school

Grants & Awards

THE Alabama Library Association annually hosts an awards ceremony to recognize the outstanding efforts of libraries across the state. At the 2021 virtual conference, the Citizens For A Better Grand Bay received the Merit Award, and the **Mobile County Commission** received the Public Servant Award for their joint efforts to open the new Grand Bay Library. The Grand Bay Library opened in November 2020 and is the newest library location in the Mobile Public Library system, bringing the total number of library locations across Mobile County to 11.

Mobile Public Library is also pleased to announce that we are a recipient of a \$238,000 grant from the Alabama Public Library Service (APLS). The funds are a part of the American Rescue Plan Act, which are federal funds distributed through APLS. The grant will be used to purchase 156 new desktop computers plus the software that goes with them. We're excited to make these computers available to the public across our library system!

Mobile Public Library: 120 Years of Service

1901

An act of the Legislature allowed for the establishment of a public library. By February, the Mobile Public Library Association opened a reading room in the old Krebs home on Conti and Hamilton streets known as the "Little Library."



1951

The first Bookmobile for the Mobile Public Library was presented by the Red Cross, and library services were extended countywide.



1925-1928

The City of Mobile issued a bond of \$250,000 to start the construction of the main library building. The facility was built in classical Greek style, and the Ben May Main Library opened officially in September of 1928.

1961

The Mobile Public Library became the first library in the state of Alabama to integrate.

2020

Grand Bay Library opened in November to reach more citizens of Mobile County, thanks to a decade-long effort of fundraising through the Citizens for a Better Grand Bay and the Mobile County Commission.

2002

Two new libraries were opened: West Regional Library on Grelot Rd. and the Toulminville Branch Library on Stanton Rd
