

A Vision of Reconciliation with Ben Raines and Clotilda Descendants



Tn 2021, June 19 became a federal and state holiday known as Juneteenth **National Independence Day** to commemorate the post-Civil War emancipation of enslaved African-Americans. On Saturday. June 18, the Mobile Public Library is proud to present a signature event exploring the recent global attention Mobile has received for our unique history in the slave trade and how our response going forward will shape our community. Ben Raines, the awardwinning environmental journalist, filmmaker, author and charter captain, who


discovered the wreckage of the Clotilda in April 2018, will discuss his book "The Last Slave Ship: The True Story of How Clotilda Was Found, Her Descendants, and an Extraordinary Reckoning" at 2:00 p.m. in Bernheim Hall at the Ben May Main Library. He will be joined on a Q&A panel by Darron Patterson and Joycelyn Davis of the Clotilda Descendants Association, along with Vickii Howell, founder of the M.O.V.E Gulf Coast Community Development Corporation. They will discuss the importance of how our future actions will help to define the character

> of our community and the quality of life for all of the residents of Africatown and Mobile.

Hailing from Mobile, Walter was known worldwide as a poet, author, gourmand, puppeteer, actor and theater costume designer. After living in Europe and New York. Walter returned to Mobile in 1979, where he was

in the vault at the Local History & Genealogy Department of the library, as well as Mardi Gras costume designs from Auburn, are also on display.

Panels about the process of costume design are accompanied by tutus on loan from the University of **Alabama Theatre and Dance** Department. Walter's fondness for dressing his felines in

> tutus is reflected in a children's element of the exhibit that invites younger visitors to design a costume on our free cat template. Youth are

welcome to design their cat in costume at the Ben May Main Library or take it home and return it to become part of a library display. Bringing the whimsy full circle, visitors of all ages can have their photo made by posing in a cutout of a dancing cat in a tutu designed by local artist and library staff member Jaime Lee.

Updates From the Friends of the Mobile Public Library


